Russell Road ...

Plans for a New Green Space by Paul Crowder (local resident)

I was contacted at the end of last year by a neighbour, who also helps with the BPCA, who sent me details of the possible development of the Russell Road green space. As my garden backs on to the New River I had firsthand experience of the type of use and abuse the river banks are subject to in the area. Clearly there was little but boggy ground and a few trees, but this opened up a host of possibilities for its development.

I met with Caroline Simpson from the BPCA and she gave me all the details which the Enfield Cllrs were proposing to submit for a Residents Priority Fund grant. As a Landscape Gardener and a local resident, it was comparatively easy to draw up some plans and come up with suggestions for this space. Currently just a space to pass through, it needs to be given a sense of purpose to realise its full potential. Caroline had arranged a local meeting,

which was well attended, to discuss ideas. The greatest part of the budget seemed to be allocated to fencing and changing the gates, although the view was that the existing fencing was in good repair only needed mending.

After the meeting new plans were drawn up to incorporate all our ideas - this was then presented to the Council and, after holding our breath for a few weeks, they approved a slightly revised version. Let's hope that this space becomes as successful as the other open areas in Bowes Park.

Interview with John Liddard (recently retired from Thames Water)

John Liddard, who has always been our main contact at Thames Water, retired in early January. With his help, the BPCA created the Community Garden and the Community Gym and exhibitions.

The restoration of the listed tunnel entrance and the new works in Finsbury Gardens would not have been possible without his support. For those of you who are unfamiliar with the history, the New River is one of the oldest water supply systems in the country, bringing water to London for over 400 years. John started work for Thames Water (then the Metropolitan Water Board) in 1967, as one of 'a gang' of people employed on a 2 mile stretch of water. His final roles were Fishery Manager and Amenity Manager, always overseeing the New River.

He tells us that one of the highlights of his career was his involvement in the creation of the New River Path, and he particularly enjoyed enjoyed working on projects such as the BPCA garden and gym, and seeing them come to life. The BPCA has always had a fruitful relationship with TVV and this is mainly due to John's commitment and drive in helping us to achieve some of our most successful local projects.

BUSY START TO 2014 FOR THE COMMUNITY CHOIR



A new community campaign group has been formed to help protect and promote Myddleton Road - one of Bowes Park's most important and unique assets.

It was formed by concerned residents and traders wanting to see more regeneration on the road and protection for its valuable shops and buildings.

The group's focus is to find ways for the whole community, both residents and traders, to play their part in building a better future for this much loved road – that means anything from running events like a "Cash Mob" to encourage more people to shop locally, to promoting the road and its businesses or talking to the council about how we can support the needs of existing traders.

The group is also trying to stop further decline of this unique road by reporting dumped rubbish and objecting to unwanted planning applications. It meets monthly and is looking for new members to help build on all the positive change already happening on the road.

Bowes Park People

Since it first appeared, the Bowes Park people column has featured people who have lived & worked in the area for many years. In this issue we have decided to welcome four newcomers, each of whom has opened a business in Myddleton Road in the past six months.

The two food shops have brought the tastes and smell of southern Europe to the street. Goulielmos Alafouzos who runs the The **Hellenic Gourmet** comes from the Evia Island in Greece. The shop itself, with its bright blue and white front, is reminiscent of sun-drenched Greek islands. Hanging from the door are nets of snails and inside you can buy a range of Greek cheeses, meats, olives and much more.

Not far away is **La Coppia**, a 'handmade Italian Deli' run by Diletta and Alessandros. Here you can buy homemade dishes such as lasgane, ravioli, chicken Milanese to eat in or takeaway. In the small café area you can enjoy a cup of good, Italian coffee served by genuine Romans.

The two other new businesses are there to feed the ego, not the stomach. **Lucas Gentleman's Barber Shop** is now run by Kyri Kyprianou. Unlike Goulielmos, Diletta and Alessandros, Kyri was born and bred in Haringey. He previously ran a barber's shop in the 'square mile' so he says 'I have brought the City of London to Myddleton Road'. Although called a gentlemens' barbers, it is a family barber shop for all ages — men and boys.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, **Naina Hair & Beauty** is also new to Myddleton Road. Naina, who has another salon in Walthamstow, also offers waxing, facials, massage and threading. Strictly women only.

Planning Update

Some months there is a positive rash of planning applications – people are spending on improvements and alterations rather than on the even more expensive business of moving house. So do look at the Haringey (Bounds Green) and Enfield (Bowes) planning applications if you are interested.

We are delighted that after many years of negotiations and hard work, four of the Victorian properties in Myddleton Road are about to be restored and greatly improved, with majority funding from English Heritage and Haringey, and a contribution from the owners. Nos 124 – 128 will get good quality shopfronts, new timber, double glazed window frames where relevant, and hand painted fascias. 124 will also have its external brickwork cleaned.

The most lovely shopfront on the road, no 123, with its barley sugar verticals, will also be restored. All the decorated pilasters (uprights between the shopfronts) will also be restored. It would be wonderful to think that others on the road will copy the good works when they see how excellent they look.

Sadly other owners are still putting in applications to replace traditional timber window frames with UPVC (and some do it without permission at all). Others are applying to make small flats from decent family houses (and do that without permissions also). Please object when you can. It is not "spying", it is trying to keep our residents well housed in decent buildings.
