The Prince Pub

One of the area's finest buildings, and what could be its best pub, is about to re-open!

The Prince is in the Trinity Road Conservation Area, included in Haringey's *Register of Local Listed Buildings of Merit* in 1997. It is a fine Victorian pub built in 1868, with lovely original tile work outside and a largely unspoilt interior.

Many people remember the Prince of Wales pub when it was a happy, lively, busy and very friendly local with good beers, a fine pool table, and a piano. Despite a short period with a wonderful Thai lady chef called Tip it has gone downhill in recent years. It closed in late 2014 and many felt that perhaps it was to be yet another pub destined for property development. It was opened again for a few weeks last year, but closed again. There was a lot of discussion on the Bowes and Bounds Connected website, and the suggestion was made for it to be formally designated as an Asset of Community Value (ACV). Richard Maltz and Richard McKeever worked hard to jump through all the necessary hoops, and the Council listed it on 8 October last year.

On 14 March, Martin Aberdeen gave us all some very good news. He said, "After long protracted negotiations we've finally got the keys for The Prince. We have one other pub – The Duke's Head in Highgate, and plan to open up The Prince on similar lines to focus on great beer, food and strong links to the local community."

The word on the street is that The Duke's Head is an excellent pub, and it will be great to have one like it here.

The free house will showcase the best of independent cask and keg beer, alongside a variety of wines and spirits, supporting local providers where possible. The food offer will likely be a pop-up restaurant during the summer, with a managed kitchen coming further down the line. For those wondering what is to happen with the side room where the pool table once resided, the plan is to install a feature 2.5bbl microbrewery to supply the two pubs, alongside further dining and drinking areas.

As this newsletter goes to press a team of workmen, led by Julian and accompanied by his golden Labrador, Nougat, is working on the interior and they hope the pub will reopen in the next four to six weeks.





Support it, drink its ales, and have fun using it so we don't lose it again!

Community Choir

We had a very successful December concert which, together with the collection at the carol singing by Bounds Green Station, raised £725.18, which was donated to the North London Hospice.

This summer we will be joining an exciting project for the opening of the new wing at Tate Modern. Choirs from across London will come together, bringing 500 voices to sing in the Turbine Hall. The music has been specially commissioned by the Tate to celebrate the opening. We have had our first workshop with Peter Liversidge, the poet commissioned to write the words and music for The Bridge, and we are looking forward to participating.

The event will take place on Saturday 18 June, and all are welcome to come and enjoy the fantastic new building as well as the performance.

Bowes Park People: *Katherine Gallagher*

Katherine Gallagher, poet, has lived in Bowes Park for 36 years. Leaving her home in Australia she travelled, via the Himalayas, Paris and south London, to finally put her roots down in north London. On the way she met her future husband, Bernard, and

they have a son, Julien. Her choice of home has been a real 'bonne chance' for the development of poetry in the area.

Katherine's early education in a convent boarding school did not motivate her to be a poet! Nor did the hardware store in which she subsequently worked provide much inspiration — that came later at university. Her first work, a poem against hanging, reflected her humanitarian views. A first collection of poems, 'The Eye's Circle' was brought out in 1974, and many others have followed.

Katherine has always been aware of the need to promote local poets and poetry. Her work in schools, both as a supply teacher and as a writer in residence, has encouraged students to express themselves through the medium. In 2010, pupils at Bounds Green School worked with Katherine to produce a series of poems celebrating the anniversary of the New River, which was published by the BPCA. In addition, Katherine has been a judge for the Junior Section of the Barnet Open Poetry Competition for 21 years.

In 2012, her poem "The Year of the Tree" was chosen for the Guardian poem of the week blog, and was made into a two-minute film by Andrew Spicer – go to https://vimeo.com/137127851 to watch this delightful little film. With another local poet, Myra Schneider, and others, the "Poetry in Palmers Green" group provides twice-yearly readings and they have just been appointed Poets in Residence in the new Palmers Green Library, offering workshops, readings and children's events.

Katherine's latest collection of poems will be published in October. Titled "Acres of Light", it is dedicated to her brother who planted twenty thousand trees in Central Victoria, Australia. Katherine sees WB Yeats and the Australian poet, Judith Wright as major influences, for "their skills, their love of poetry and never giving up.".

Having lived in Bowes Park for 36 years, Katherine has seen many changes in the area. She is extremely supportive and grateful to the BPCA for its work on improving the area, especially for different age groups, but regrets the loss of a community centre which she feels One-Two-Eight provided a few years ago.

Russell Road Green Space or ???

In the Spring 2014 newsletter we featured the proposals for improvements to a piece of unused space at the end of Russell Road, where the New River goes under the North Circular and then on to Palmers Green. Enfield Councillors agreed that it should be funded from the Resident Priority Fund and we hoped work would start in 2014. Oh dear! It took another 18 months for Thames Water and Enfield to agree and sign the lease, but in November we were told it was full steam ahead. We had meetings with officers and councillors, meetings for residents, drawings and financial calculations by officers, leaflet drops to all residents with the agreed plan, hundreds of emails back and forth to make sure we had agreement and no misunderstandings – and then in February the work started on the ground.

Major tree removal and pruning was required and the new fence and gates went in. It was at that point that the work on the ground did not appear to follow the plan that a Council Officer in the Highways Design team had drawn up and that we – the BPCA and the residents – had all agreed on.

But the weather was bad and our lead BPCA person was away for a fortnight, and work continued on the ground. We now have an extra gate, an extra expensive tarmac path, one seat instead of two, some giant angular slabs of stone near the fence instead of playful rounded boulders on the far side and one large tree trunk like a stranded whale on the bare earth.

At the time of going to press we don't know what the 'new' planting scheme is, or even if there is one. Where is our 'Edible Hedge'? The 'Screen planting' at the north end? Are the three trees really fruit trees? And what about the 'Wildflower Meadow' and the 'Ornamental Grasses'? The second bench? Are they going to happen.... Yes or No? And does it matter either way? The small area of unloved scrub and rubbish has been transformed!

In five years time we hope there will be a charming green and flowering area, with a few odd things for kids to climb on, grass to have a picnic on, daisies to make a daisy chain, and hopefully people will pick up their dog mess and there will be no broken glass and beers cans. Memory will have faded about what might have been, and we will have what is. And indeed — what is it?
